



Our months seemed to have flown by and the end of third grade has approached quickly. It was a fantastic year getting to know each of the girls and watching them grow. They filled my heart with joy and happiness on a daily basis. The girls have worked very hard this year. In the last month, we worked on writing narrative stories; dabbled with poetry - acrostic, limerick, cinquain and haiku; reviewed punctuation rules; learned about comparative and superlative adjectives; read informational text regarding seasons, the sun, the Yellowstone Park, tornadoes, hurricanes and life cycle of the butterfly. We had our field trip to the Butterfly Wonderland which was educational and fun.



The girls had also studied about the 13 Original Colonies, the reason for their existence and their importance according to each region. We also learned about the continents and their special characteristics, i.e. rivers, land mass, mountain ranges, population, deserts...

In Math, we worked on calculating elapsed time in word problems, estimated and measured mass using grams and kilograms; measured liquid volume using milliliters and liters. We learned how to find unknown side lengths of different polygons by calculating the perimeter, and determining the area of different polygons in relation to addition and multiplication. Last, we learned about two-dimensional shapes, identifying different angles, lines of symmetry, line segments, and sides and vertices of different polygons. Your daughter will bring home a summer review packet which will help her prepare for 4th Grade. Wishing you a safe and relaxing summer.

Rabbi Miller:

Dear Parents,

Wow, how fast this year has flown by. Boruch Hashem, we have accomplished so much in our time together. The talmidim have learned almost five prokim of Tanya Baal Peh this year! We have made unbelievable strides in davening, and our class now davens the entire Pesukei Dezimra, as well as almost all of Birchos Krias Shema. We learned the three parshiyos of Shema with trop this year, and also added a few sections (Parshas Akeida, Rebbe Yishmael) from tefilas hashachar. The Talmidim should be so proud of everything they have accomplished!

But, Boruch Hashem, there is much more! We learned the entire mishnayos Masechta Sukka (five perokim, 53 mishnayos) in depth, breaking down each Mishna to really understand how a Mishna works, as well as all of the details, milim and musogim that arise throughout the masechta.

We learned 4 parshiyos in Chumash (Toldos-VaYeishev; 15 perokim), including selected Rashis both inside and outside the text. We focused on identifying shem etzem and poalim, and used that as a basis to better understand and memorize new shorashim. We also learned many new teitchen.

Additionally, we covered all of the various yomei dipagra and yomim tovim in halacha, as well as other halacha subjects throughout the topics of kashrus, mezuzah, kibbud av v'eim, tzitzis and maacholei akum. Talmidim completed course books in yedios klolios, and over the time of sefiras haomer we completed a full course on refining our middos based on stories and activities drawn from the Rebbe's hanhogos. This course led to many amazing discussions and comments from the talmidim!

In addition to the above, we worked on refining our ksiva, kria, krias Rashi and dikduk. We also learned through the sichos of Likutei Sichos chelek Alef for our weekly dvar Torah. In

biur tefilla, we went through topics related to brochos in general, as well as birchos Hatorah and some parts of She-moneh Esrei for chol.

This past Friday we had a class barbeque and farbrengen where each talmid had the opportunity to share which areas he is most proud of in his accomplishments this year, as well as one thing that they would like to continue to improve on.

There is a story of the Rebbe Rayatz, when two talmidim from Brazil were returning to their parents for yom tov, they entered for yechidus and the Rebbe asked what they were bringing back with them. The boys answered, "We are returning with what we learned in yeshiva." The Rebbe Rayatz pointed out that the main thing is not what you learned, but rather, what the Torah has taught you, meaning that the Torah has affected a change in your practical life. It is my hope and brocho that each talmid takes from this year buckets and buckets of yedios, as well as a true feeling of love for learning Torah and serving Hashem.

Every talmid should be so proud of all of the chayus and koichois they invested in their learning this year, and with Hashem's help should continue in the path that our Rebbe laid out for us, which will certainly culminate in greeting Moshiach, may it be today!

We have been reading a series of biographies that are very inspiring. We started with Florence Nightingale, who was born into a family of extreme wealth, but chose instead to be a nurse who eventually served in the Crimean War. After the girls researched the war, they were shocked at the terrible conditions in the hospitals. Florence Nightingale was responsible for making those hospitals sanitary, and, when she returned to England, she fought a long, uphill battle to do the same there. We next read about Helen Keller, who in a passage at the end, challenged everyone to appreciate all the senses they have, especially their sight and hearing, and try to imagine what their life would be like without them. She lived a full life, and we should too! I brought in information about Sandra Day O'Connor, the first

woman appointed to the Supreme Court. She grew up on a ranch in Arizona, where she learned to be self-sufficient. When she was in the Senate she hosted bipartisan dinners at her home in Paradise Valley, where she did her own cooking, usually Mexican. The girls were very impressed by the fact that she quit the Supreme Court to take care of her husband, who had been diagnosed with Alzheimer's.


In addition, the girls chose a part of WW II that they were interested in, and each gave a report with a visual aid. Reports varied from the women of WW II, Pearl Harbor, D-Day, Winston Churchill, Spies of WW II, two book reports, and a timeline of the war. They were all extremely interesting!



You must have at least a 12- inch by 12-inch base.


You can only use straws (although you may cut them up for support purposes).


No tape, glue or other items may be used.
